ZOOM INSTRUCTIONS

- 1. Download and install Zoom onto your device.
 - a. Computer go to <u>https://zoom.us/download#client_4meeting</u>
 - b. Tablets and smartphones, install Zoom from your App Store. This version of Zoom will look different than the computer version.
- 2. Joining the Meeting:
 - a. You should have received a "Registration" link in order to register for the meeting (commissioners from churches should have received this from their pastor; minister members from the Stated Clerk. The website will also have this link for registration)
 - b. After you register, you will be emailed a link to join the meeting. This link is unique to you. We will send a reminder on Monday, August 15, 2022.
 - c. To join the meeting, click the link and allow Zoom to open on your device.
 - d. Choose your audio input setting; choose computer audio if you are unsure.
 - e. You will be placed in the waiting room when you join the meeting. Please do not disconnect. The hosts will let you in when we are ready to begin. There will be pre-presbytery music 10 minutes before the start of the meeting.
- 3. Meeting Settings:
 - a. If there are multiple voting commissioners in a household, you will need to use one device per commissioner to vote. This is to allow each vote in the household to be counted.
 - b. Please be a few minutes early and adjust your settings during this time. Double check that your video and audio are working. If you are using video, check that lighting is good and minimize background distractions if possible. We will be admitting attendees beginning at 8:45 if you want to join early to be sure you are able to connect.
 - c. Please note: You must use the link from your computer or other smart device to participate in the meeting. If you join using the dial-in numbers, you will be able to listen to the meeting but you will not be able to vote, speak, or otherwise participate, and the attendance information will not reflect your presence.
 - d. Please keep your audio on mute. If you have a question or comment, use the chat feature to message the meeting host, Chip Blankinship. The host will let the Moderator know and the Moderator will call on you to speak. The host will unmute you when called on and resume muting after you are finished speaking.
 - e. Turning on your video feed is optional but audio is required to participate in discussion.
- 4. There will be times when votes are necessary. At those times, you will be instructed as to how to cast your vote.

OFFERING INFORMATION

Today's offering supports CHRIS 180, a behavioral health organization that is committed to addressing the social determinants of health to better help individuals, children and adults heal and be able to change directions and change their lives. CHRIS 180 seeks to improve the community by providing children, adults, and families with high-quality, trauma-informed behavioral health services and support systems. CHRIS stands for the core values of the organization: Creativity, Honor, Respect, Integrity and Safety.



CHRIS 180 was established in 1981 as Georgia CHARLEE (Children Have All Rights-Legal, Educational, and Emotional) to fill a gap in services for children and youth with behavioral and emotional challenges who were not thriving in foster homes and needed small specialized group homes. In 1986, the organization recognized another gap in services and created Georgia's first independent living program to help youth aging out of foster care.

In the years since, CHRIS 180 has added services to homeless youth, including targeted outreach to LGBTQ+ youth; permanent supportive housing for single and parenting youth; adoption services; and counseling services for mental health and substance abuse treatment.



Vital Congregations Initiative – Mark #3 – Outward Incarnational Focus

Our third mark on the VCI journey is "Outward Incarnational Focus." It is a reminder of the mission of the church to reach out to others. It is a reminder that we are called to be a tangible expression of Christ's love and compassion in the world. It also reminds me of my mother's words to me as a child: "Remember, Aisha, you may be the only Bible a person has a chance to read." It was her way of instilling in me the importance of knowing that my faith should lead me to see others, to hear their needs, and to be a reflection of God's love to all.

I have often seen congregations post a sign near the exit that says, "You are now entering the mission field." These words are a similar reminder to the church that their mission stretches beyond the church's walls. At times, the church can become so concerned with getting people in the pews that we miss the opportunity to be the church in the mall, at the cafeteria, in the coffee shop, in the park, at the laundromat, in the library, and every place in between. I am so thankful for the ministry partners we have within our own presbytery. They remind us to keep an outward focus that represents Christ's own call to preach good news to the poor, to release the captives, to give sight to the blind, to set the oppressed free, and to proclaim the year of the Lord's favor. At our Stated Meeting, I pray that we all get to learn something new about our partnerships and reimagine ways each of us can have an outward Christ-embodied focus as we continue to spread the good news of God's unfailing love for us all.

For more than 30 years, la Gonâve Haiti Partners has been working in collaboration with the Episcopal Diocese of Haiti to support programs that build capacity for an improved quality of life for Haitians living on la Gonâve island. Nineteen churches across eight states, individuals, and other institutions partner with our Haitian brothers and sisters to support pre K-12 education for over 1500 students, healthcare for thousands of patients, and economic development opportunities to families through micro finance loans and the Kid-for-a-Kid goat program. Recent initiatives include a new rural middle school that will open this fall, and a computer literacy curriculum for students

attending the K-12 school with the arrival of the St. Francis computer lab, and creation of an integrated network of health care providers across the island that addresses maternal and infant health and childhood malnutrition. We welcome new churches to learn more about joining our partnership.

Peace and Global Witness Partnership

The Peace and Global Witness Partnership is established to promote the efficacy of Peace throughout our global community and nation. To effectuate this process of Peace, the Partnership has incorporated several Ministries which range in service population to International Students (Ministry of Amis), The Prison Movement (Ncart), Local homelessness Service projects, El Refugio and detainee programs as well as the Sanctuary Movement located at Columbia Presbyterian Church. In addition, collaborations are underway to integrate the work of Mission Haven with local church ministries. Further the development of the Institute for Public Theology under the auspices of Columbia Presbyterian Church has begun preliminary

discussions with Columbia Seminary in an effort to develop a cross section of curricular designed to enhance public theology praxis with seminary training.



A brief statement of the inquirer's faith journey is attached.

Faith Journey Statement

Sun Young Choi

I was born in South Korea and raised in a family having strong traditions of Confucianism with 13 annual ancestral worship ceremonies. My mother, though she was a Christian as a child, was not able to go to church due to her in-law's strong opposition when she married my father. However, by the providence of God, my brother and I were allowed to go to church since we were young. My mother, my brother, and I prayed together for my father's salvation, and the prayer was answered in a very unexpected way.

When I was 15, my father was diagnosed with terminal liver cancer. Facing his death, by the incredible grace of God, he sincerely accepted Jesus as his Lord and savior. In spite of the fervent opposition of family elders, he broke all the traditions of Confucianism and made a path for my family to serve God alone. Although he soon went to eternal peace, since then, most of my family members, including extended family members, have become Christians one by one. Though his physical body perished, his spiritual legacy still lasts in my family through the generations.

Through this experience, I came to know God as Creator, the Almighty, and a loving father; however, it wasn't until my second year of college that I finally accepted Jesus as my true savior. At that time, I was actively serving my home church as a praise & worship team member; however, deep inside my heart, I was struggling with the dilemma that though I loved God, I still liked to sin. I started to clearly face my sinful nature which I could not solve or eradicate by my own human endeavor. The only thing I could do was desperately ask for God's mercy. Then, I began to feel that the Holy Spirit came to me and gave me an understanding of what I had heard of Jesus more than a hundred times before - a pure lamb, atonement, redemption, paying my debt, and much more. It was like pieces of a puzzle finally found their place. Finally, I began to understand the priceless love on the Cross given "not by human endeavor, but by the blood of the lamb," and the sacrificial love "taking away the sin of the world."

This amazing love has also changed my whole world view, from an 'I- centered' view to a 'Jesus and others - centered' view. Having grown more in the love of Christ, I came to realize how God so loved the world and that God called me to live an abundant Christian life of sharing God's love with other people. This led me to search for God's specific calling on me to use my gifts for God and for others and the world, and that was to dedicate my life to recover the image of God and the fullness of God's plan in people. After graduating from college in Korea, I fulfilled my calling by being professionally trained as a Marriage and Family Therapist at Fuller Theological Seminary.

Through my training and then working as a Marriage and Family Therapist, I gratefully had the experience to bring hope and encouragement to individuals, couples, families, and groups who were in times of despair and emotional breakdown. In particular, as I was given plenty of opportunities to work with the Korean-American/Korean immigrant population, I, myself as a Korean immigrant, came to understand and deeply empathize with their unique struggles related to acculturational discrepancy among generations and family disorganization, along with general psychological and relational issues.

And now, I hope to expand my boundary as an MFT and help people with a more spiritually-focused perspective by being equipped as a pastor at Columbia Theological Seminary and under the care of PCUSA. I feel my heart pounding with passion for the Korean immigrant families and churches/communities. Particularly, since female ministers are short in number in Korean immigrant churches, and still are not very welcomed in its patriarchal cultural context, I have witnessed that the delicate needs of women are often disregarded or even ignored. As a woman, a wife, and a mother myself, I do hope to serve them with empathy, sensitivity, and cultural understandings in order that they can be equipped as God's transforming agents for their families, churches, and the broader society. I also hope to continue to develop and organize Bible study groups designed for wives and mothers, couples and families, and Christian parenting education groups, so that people can experience God's healing and restoration as a body of Christ as they hold each other accountable with love and respect. Currently, I am serving as a children's minister at one of the PCUSA churches in the Greater Atlanta Presbytery. I believe that God is transforming each family through these kids and will eventually bring positive changes to the whole church, the Koran American communities, and the broader society.

Rev. Dr. Victor Aloyo, Jr., M.Div., Ed.D. Statement of Faith Journey

The poet John O'Donohue writes that a dynamic life can be distilled to this: coming to thresholds—to points of inflection, to edges, to entryways—and crossing them "worthily." That's a difficult word for me. It suggests that my interactions are impactful in a meaningful way; that the God who shaped me from clay has placed a unique and wonderful calling in my heart; that it matters who I'm with, where I am, and what I do. My faith journey comprises transformative moments of thresholds that have moved me closer to myself, my calling, and God. In a hundred signs and secret languages, God has called me to study, reflect, and serve in the company of the whole people of God and diverse communities.

My faith journey and aspirations are based on a critical understanding and recognition of God's presence in my life through the saving grace of Jesus Christ and the power of the Holy Spirit. This salvific plan includes my developing story of who I am as a son, husband, father, friend, minister, and trusted colleague. I am the son of the late Esperanza Aloyo and Victorino Aloyo from Vieques, Puerto Rico. Married to Suzette Aloyo for over thirty-five years, we are blessed with two daughters, Kayla Cristen, an aerospace engineer working in Huntsville, AL, and Alyssa Nicole, serving as a DEI administrator at Vanderbilt University in Nashville, TN.

When I was thirteen, my mother delivered a sermon that changed my life on a precious Sunday. She said in part, "According to Deuteronomy 31:6, God will never leave you, nor God will forsake you. Trust God. Let your faith take the risk." Although I had heard hundreds of sermons about Jesus, this message felt different. It was as if God's Word was echoing within me. So, I dedicated my life to the journey with the One whose image I am created. I vowed to let God's will always have preeminence in my life from that day. In this commitment, my call to ministry embraces important principles of adaptive leadership, innovation in strategic planning, trust-building, equitable distribution of resources, and access to education. My intentions to equip the saints for ministry and my desire to continue exploring and modeling how God intersects my leadership and spiritual formation gifts lead me to serve as the next President of Columbia Theological Seminary and an integral member of the Greater Atlanta Presbytery.

As an ordained Minister of Word and Sacraments for the past thirty-two years and a Ruling Elder six years prior, I am grateful to serve in transformative ministries within newly organized and revitalized congregations as a lead and organizing pastor in urban environments in New York and New Jersey. Serving multicultural, multigenerational, and multilingual communities of faith has broadened my understanding of effective congregational ministry, strategic planning, vision-casting, leadership collaboration, spiritual formation, and volunteer development. My involvement in the PCUSA's governing bodies or councils has been a critical part of my formation as a partner and colleague in the expansion of God's kin-dom. [1]

I am grateful to God for these and many transformative moments and thresholds that have called me to serve in multiple arenas and vineyards of faith. I joyfully continue to learn by walking with God in meaningful ways that incorporate the stories of loved ones, colleagues, neighbors, and strangers in my life.

STATEMENT OF FAITH Rev. Dr. Victor Aloyo, Jr. "My soul finds rest in God alone; my salvation comes from him." – Psalm 62:1

I believe in the one triune God, Creator of the heavens and earth. I believe that all order of things, visible and invisible, are sustained by God's Word. I believe in God, who formed humankind in God's likeness and image, and although, in its fallen state, God gave humanity and the order of creation the hope of restoration. I believe in God, who is near and in our midst.

I believe in Jesus Christ, my Lord and Redeemer, the only begotten Son of God who is the Word become flesh, Emmanuel, God with us. I believe in his conception by the Holy Spirit through the Virgin Mary, the instrument used for the incarnation of the Word of God. In Jesus, we see God's love for us and with us. Jesus taught the people, cared for them, fed and broke bread with them, and forgave and healed them. I am called to be an imitator of Jesus Christ and to serve and not to be served. I believe in his prophetic and priestly ministry, passion, death, bodily resurrection, and the promise of his second coming for his Church. In Christ, I am redeemed and reborn! I have reconciled to the Father in Christ and no longer face eternal separation. Nothing here on earth or above can ever separate me from the love of God, for the resurrection of Christ is the eternal testimony of the victory of life over death.

I believe in the Holy Spirit, God's Word in us and amongst us. The Holy Spirit enables me to state, "Jesus is Lord!" Through the gift of faith in Jesus Christ, the Holy Spirit marks and seals me as a child of God. The Holy Spirit helps me to live a life worthy of the gospel of Jesus Christ as it makes me aware of my shortcomings, enables me to grow in the name of Christ, and with each passing moment, allows me to acknowledge that I was once lost, and now I am found. Through the work of the Holy Spirit, I am called as a Minister of the Word and Sacraments to serve in a ministry of reconciliation begun in Christ.

I believe the Church to be comprised of the believers of Jesus Christ as his mystical and visible body. The Church manifests God's comforting presence in Christ, the only true foundation. We are called to build one another up in the love of God. As we build each other up, we are also called to reach out to those with God's reconciling message that in Christ, there is forgiveness. We are called to be for one another, and, therefore, we are called to be in community with the world that needs to hear the life-giving message of the Gospel.

I believe The Scriptures are composed of the Old and New Testaments and are the Word of God, revealing the plan of salvation as proclaimed through individuals who lived, in particular, circumstances and contexts. I believe that the Scriptures' reading, study, and proclamation are vital for growth in grace and knowledge through the community of faith, the Church. Its message is always relevant, and the call of holiness to communion with God and our neighbors is the same as in the past.

I believe Jesus Christ instituted two sacraments, Baptism and the Lord's Supper. I believe in Baptism as a means of grace that signifies entrance into the faith community. Baptism is a sign and seal of cleansing into Christ and entry into the covenant of grace. In the Lord's Supper, we remember and proclaim the death of Jesus Christ. We celebrate the redeeming work of Christ, and at the same time, we boldly announce his inevitable return in glory. I believe that the elements (the bread and cup) of the Lord's Supper are symbolic (body and blood of Jesus Christ), and the call to participate, remember and proclaim his death, resurrection, and presence through the Holy Spirit is open to all as they have professed Jesus as Lord and Savior.

Reverend Jasmine K. Evans, M.Div. - Faith Journey

Even though I have been in church my entire life, my faith journey really began in college. The year I started at Winston-Salem State University was a pivotal year. I was fresh off the heels of a familial fallout that revealed how much pastors struggle to maintain the boundaries of family and church. I was also finally choosing a career path that focused on my passions and gifts instead of how much money I could make. And to top it all off, I fell in love with someone that I thought I would spend the rest of my life with, and we became pregnant. Through each decision, choice, and new life circumstance, I decided I needed God more and more.

So, when I was hired as a campus intern at Saint James, I took it as a sign from God. I felt like my life was falling apart. I was overwhelmed by my course load, parenting, and working a fast-food job. Each week as I showed up at Saint James for my internship, I began to feel God pull me closer. I wanted to know God deeply, and I wanted to know God in community with other college students and young adults. The church was warm and welcoming. They loved me and my daughter. It was a love that could only come from having a deep relationship with the Divine. That love in that community sustained me.

After graduation I became even more involved with Saint James at-large and as a direct result I began to feel better and closer to God. One day, someone from the church called me and asked if I might be interested in working in the front office. They advised me that I would have to apply for the position, interview, and work hard, but they thought that I would be a good candidate. After a few volunteer days and a couple of interviews, I was hired. It was just the break I needed, and it was right where God wanted me to be.

The front office at Saint James was a ministry in and of itself. People came by for church business, but they often came by for prayer and venting and deep conversations. That was the part of the job that no one told me about, but it was the part that filled me up the most. I would sit in my office for hours with members who ultimately just needed someone to pray with them and to listen to their stories. That office was a holy place. It was sacred. I still get misty thinking about the moments I shared with so many congregants over those two years. And unknowingly, it was that experience and working with so many Spirit-filled Black women who were walking in their calling that led me to mine. They paved the way first by ministering to me at my lowest moments. In the moments when I felt like I had no value, they reminded me that me and my daughter were both made in the image of God. They reminded me that we had a purpose. They taught me to seek God for guidance and to trust God's plan for our lives. When I began sharing those same teachings and reassuring words with others in the office, I began to see my self-image transform. This is what God was leading me to all this time.

I answered God's call to ministry by going to obtain a Master of Divinity degree from Wake Forest University's School of Divinity. At Wake I was able to learn the language of the theology that had been brewing in my heart ever since I left the Sovereign Grace Baptist and Missionary Baptist churches my mother and I attended when I was growing up. I met people who pushed me to explore my theological interests and found myself engulfed in Women's, Gender and Sexuality courses paired with the Presbyterian required courses. I encountered God outside of the church in a very real way - in classrooms, in the gym, on the campus lawn and in the living room of our shared grad school house. At each turn, my faith in God rooted and reaffirmed me that I was headed in the right direction.

Now that I have been ordained it feels like a full circle moment - not just for me and my daughter, but for every person who poured into my life these past twelve years. God met me and so many other people at 820 Ross Avenue in Greensboro and because of it, I am changed and called to walk with others through their spiritual transformations.

In my current positions (Supply Pastor at Grace Presbyterian Church and Pastor of Faith Point Fellowship), I am honored to serve two very different congregations. Grace has an older population of Sunday church goers who love their church and love God. Faith Point is a 1001 New Worshipping Community serving college students at HBCU's and other local universities. Both ministries have something in common: loving people where they are and praying for God to lead us all in our faith journey's. My experiences at both congregations will inform my ministry at North Avenue Presbyterian Church as an Associate Pastor of Young Adults. I am looking forward to helping build a ministry focused on God's love and authentic community. I plan to use my professional skills to engage students in faith conversations, serving the church and the community as well as leading them in worship. I seek to help reignite current young adults desire for spiritual connection and growth while being a supportive pastor to the church at-large. I hope that the experiences of all involved, deep study of the Word and joyful fellowship will be aspects that will shape and define the future of this ministry.

My faith in God stands on one simple point - God is good.

God is the good shepherd and the good defender. The evil that is present in the world exists outside of God's goodness and has no bearing on the belief that God has a plan for my life.

I believe that God's love for me, the community, and the world stems from God's goodness.

Biologically, I am described as a 49 year old caucasian female. Further, I could biographically be described as a recovering addict, lesbian, and/or a survivor of childhood trauma. I can be described as one who is guarded and then at other times described as emotionally honest and open. Essentially all these things make up part of who I am. However, I believe the most accurate statement about who I am is someone who fought for a long time to establish myself as someone of worth. The church I attended as a child, was a frightening place that spoke about Christ in terms of fiery judgement. I was afraid of Him and knew He would not find me worthy. I sought to be given this worth from my parents, but they were violent and incapable of affirming my worth. I endeavored to establish worth by seeking recovery and staying clean since I was 18, but I found worth is never based on social acceptability. I believed a college degree would raise me into the ranks of the worthy, but was told that degrees are too easy come by and ultimately worthless. I railed against the UMC who claimed that while I was worthy of being accepted into their number and baptized, I was not worthy of ordination because I was a self-avowed lesbian. Yet with every one of those denials, at least on some cellular level, I found myself incapable of believing I had no worth. Years later, I found myself at a doctor's office being told that a tests revealed an elevated pancreatic tumor marker. While going through tests and four surgeries, I began to have brutal and real conversations with God. My faith became stronger. I relied on God to get me through each day. In the end, all the organs and tissue removed from me were not cancerous. I went back to work, but struggled with attention to detail and was scrutinized by my employers. Oddly with everything I experienced in my life, this was the proverbial straw that broke the camel's back. On the way to another follow-up, I lashed out at God. I could not understand why I had been delivered through all that I had only to then fail. I asked if I was not worth better. When my doctor saw me, she sat down and listened to me. I realize now that she was my chaplain in that moment. She validated my concerns about God, but never affirmed them. She also encouraged me to seek a spiritual community to explore my fears and beliefs about God. I began attending Emory Presbyterian, where I examined my relationship with God, resolved my fears about God, and soon experienced the same call to ministry I had in college. I enrolled in Candler School of Theology and completed my first year, but earned my degree at Princeton Theological Seminary in 2017. From there, I completed a CPE residency at Wellspan Hospital in York, PA. I enrolled in a second year residency, but was released from the program. I found myself challenged to lean into the worth I was given through Christ's sacrifice, but no matter what I felt about myself God's love kept moving me forward. I worked for almost two years in hospice after returning home to Georgia. While I enjoyed the work. I could not discern it was where I was being called. After a period of discernment, I accepted a call at Children's Hospital of Atlanta, Egelston and I knew as soon as I stepped into a crisis that I was where I was supposed to be. In the most simplistic of terms, I am someone who believes that worth cannot be earned nor given by another person or institution. My undeserved worth has been established by God, offered to me by God's grace, and sealed by Christ's sacrifice, and resurrection. Thus, I am someone who truly wants to live in service to God. That I am defined as worthy and because of that gift I want to work to spread this Good News to the world.

Statement of Faith — Dana Gray

I believe in God, who is supreme, merciful, and who has always been and always will be. I believe the will of God cannot be subverted, impacted, nor manipulated by human behavior nor prayer. God's grace has been, and forever will be, offered for the redemption of the world from sin.

I believe that Jesus Christ is the Son of God. I believe that God's grace is offered through covenant in Christ, which was, and forever will be, offered to the world by the birth, life, ministry, sacrifice, death, and resurrection of Jesus Christ.

I believe God's grace through covenant in Christ is communicated to the world by the Holy Spirit. I believe that having encountered the words of Holy Scripture, the Holy Spirit convicts one of their own brokenness and the need for redeeming grace of God through the salvific covenant in Christ. I believe the Holy Spirit encourages confession of belief in the covenant offered by God through the death and resurrection of Jesus, upon which the ugly stain of sin is wiped from the confessor, in God's eye, and is assured to the confessor by the Holy Spirit. I believe the offer of covenantal relationship is a surety from God to the world that is infinitely offered and never to be rescinded.

I believe the world is interminably broken and that human beings are incapable of securing own salvation, except through the love, mercy, and grace of the One Triune God. I believe that no human is nor will ever be able to accomplish meritorious award of such a gift nor complete any work that would guarantee the perpetuity of the promise offered.

I believe that although, the Trinity is expressed as three persons to convey who these three interact with the world, in fact, God, Jesus Christ, and the Holy Spirit are the One Triune God, who are equitable, indivisible, and irreducible.

I believe the sacrament of Baptism is a sign that points us to engage and remember the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ, and seals us, as children of the covenant offered by God. I believe the Baptism of others, causes us to remember and be grateful for the covenant we have been given by God and invites us to live in covenantal relationship with one another.

I believe the sacrament of the Lord's Supper signifies and encourages praise for God's grace through covenant facilitated by Christ's sacrifice. I believe the Lord's Supper occasions the recipient to remember and be thankful for the death and resurrection of Christ for which we have received the blessings of remission of sin and eternal life.

I believe the church, or community of believers, is compelled by reception of God's grace to live in covenantal relationship with one another. I believe covenantal relationship is marked by its members seeking understanding, working in partnership, teaching, questioning, and challenging growth from the community of believers and the world at large. I believe being in covenantal relationship requires trust, love, fealty, and communication, and reconciliation of disputes so that we are continually striving toward the fulfillment of God's will as a community of believers.

Faith Journey — Nell Herring

I grew up in Mooresville, North Carolina where I was part of the fifth generation of McNeely/Herrings to attend First Presbyterian Church and the fourth generation to grow up in my childhood home. In a household filled with steadfast love and endless humor, my younger brother and I were raised by my parents. It was in Mooresville that my leadership skills were honed, compassion was encouraged, and the faith foundation was laid for the journey ahead.

As a teenager, I attended New Wilmington Mission Conference where I learned about mission work and took ownership of my faith formation. I was honored to serve on their 2015 Summer Service team. In this role, I had the opportunity to worship with churches throughout Cuba where I interacted with clergywomen for the first time and encountered God in new ways. Though I couldn't articulate it at the time, I now understand this season as the beginning of my call to ministry.

After this experience, I eagerly posed questions about Christianity, Presbyterianism, and global mission in my academic studies at Furman University. As I began serving as the co-Moderator of UKirk and in several church internships, I was challenged to think more seriously about ministry, which further prompted my enrollment at Columbia Theological Seminary.

The same week I applied to seminary, the church of my childhood voted ninety-four percent in favor of leaving the PC(USA) and thus became affiliated with ECO. As one of the few who challenged this decision, I was heartbroken when my church chose not to support me as I enrolled at Columbia due to my advocacy. Saddened by this, I began searching for a new church home in Atlanta. I prayerfully chose to join Shallowford Presbyterian Church. In turn, Shallowford chose to love, nurture, and encourage me in my discernment process when those who had raised me would not. The congregation became my family, held me close during the traumas and triumphs of my seminary experience, and provided incredible mentors to guide me on this ministry journey.

As part of my academic interest in the universal church and global mission, I chose to do an international supervised ministry placement through CTS in Nairobi, Kenya with the Presbyterian Church of East Africa. During my internship, I encountered countless examples of the ways in which twentieth century missionaries perpetuated harm to those they colonized in the name of God. I left with even more questions and continued to ponder what it means to be united as the body of Christ throughout the world despite differences in theology, practice, and culture.

Throughout seminary and my ordination process, I continued pondering how God might still be moving in the work of the church despite the harmful theologies, problematic practices, and misconstrued missiology that the church has perpetuated for generations. Amidst the deep questioning and my own personal difficulties, I discerned a call to serve at the intersection of faith and hardship, the place where spirituality and trauma often collide.

After graduating with a dual degree from Columbia, I moved to Louisville to dive more deeply into my call to pastoral caregiving by enrolling in the Marriage and Family Therapy program at Louisville Presbyterian Theological Seminary. Since January, I have been bi-vocational, working in children's ministry and as a therapist as I continued my studies full-time. I loved my work in both fields and yet still felt called to the intersection of pain and spirituality - one that I didn't often find in these separate spaces.

With gratitude for God's guidance in this process, I am humbled to be joining the Presbyterian Disaster Assistance staff who engage in disaster ministry on behalf of our denomination. I eagerly await the opportunity to begin building relationships with PDA staff, partners, and volunteers. I hope that together we can hear God's voice, engage in Christ's mission, and follow the movement of the Holy Spirit in our midst.

An Expression of Faith — Nell Herring

God far exceeds any being that humankind can comprehend. The world and all that is within it reflects God's creativity. God appears to and speaks through different people, mediums, cultures, times, places, and languages. As a result, God has been understood differently throughout time and culture. God is ever-present, working within all circumstances.

Jesus is incarnational, he was fully divine and also fully human choosing to live, walk, teach, and bear witness to the experiences of humanity. Jesus' ministry in the world built upon ancient Israelite understanding and modeled for people how to love God and God's creation more fully. The crucifixion of Jesus was a result of systematic injustice and the human expectation of Jesus' Messiahship. God worked through the human-inflicted suffering of the crucifixion to transform the world through Jesus' ministry and resurrection which enabled life after death.

The Holy Spirit is the divine presence in the world and has always been present in the story of God and of humanity. The Spirit's presence moving among us is as present in the human experience as breathing and prompts understanding of who God is. The Spirit is the source of artistry, prophetic speech, and inspiration, who moves humanity and compels response to the world.

Together, God the Creator, God the Christ, and God the Spirit comprise the Trinity, the three in one and one in three. The complexities of their interrelationship and singular natures can never be fully realized or articulated. The ways in which the persons of the Trinity relate to one another is complex and mysterious. Together, the Trinity enables the divine to connect with humanity more deeply.

The Bible is God-breathed and resonant of the shortcomings of its human authorship. Scripture is inspired and witnesses to who God is understood to be. It provides language for self-expression, offers wisdom regarding morality, paints a portrait of life in community, and presents many depictions of who people have understood God to be throughout time. Scripture guides the church toward God so the faithful must interpret and embody Christian teachings with thoughtfulness, respect, care, and resilience.

The church is reformed and being reformed according to the Word of God. An intentional community composed of imperfect people, the church attempts to love God and embody love in the world. The church embodies its vocation in worship through the celebration of sacraments, communal prayer, proclamation, reading of scripture, mission, and service. Though often divided, the church is one - unified as the body of Christ - and attentive to the work of the Holy Spirit.

Sacraments are symbols and signs of the gospel by which the Holy Spirit reminds us of the forgiving, renewing, and promising love of God in Jesus Christ. Realizing that God can never be fully understood, the church continues to ponder who God is and who God has called it to be as the world awaits the eschatological hope of life eternal.

Sarah Lane Statement of Faith Journey

I was born and raised in India. I grew up in a Christian household as my father was an ordained Presbyterian minister, which meant regular church attendance and weekly bible studies. However, he pastored a non-denominational church because his flocks were college students who had come from out of state for higher education to Shillong, Meghalaya, India.

In 2011 after being married and having had three beautiful children, I came to faith in Christ during a church service as I came under the conviction of the Holy Spirit. Being called to lead the new worshipping community that my father had started is genuinely joyous for me. I believe my seminary education and providing pastoral care through chaplaincy have helped me grow in the faith.

I look forward to being the third generation of Presbyterian Ministers in my family.

COMMITTEE ON MINISTRY

For Information:

In June, the Committee on Ministry received a report from its Task Force on Minimum Compensation Standards. This group was established in January 2022 to evaluate the presbytery's current minimum compensation standards set under G-3.0303c. Task force members looked at standards from other presbyteries of similar size (and cost of living in those areas); researched other models used by presbyteries for setting minimum compensation standards; sought and considered feedback from first call seekers and pastors, the Company of New Pastors, and Columbia Seminary; discussed complex issues including justice, living wage, cost of living, size and types of churches; considered church vitality throughout the lifespan of a congregation, chartering of new churches (especially immigrant and refugee churches) and churches in decline; and reviewed the previous calculation of minimum compensation standards. In June 2022, the Committee on Ministry received the report of this task force and took the following actions:

- Set 2023 minimum compensation at \$49,623.62. This number is the average of starting salaries in 2021-2022 for a first-year teacher with a master's degree in county school systems in the counties where PGA has a church with an installed pastor.
- Continue the practice of increasing the minimum compensation for an individual by 1% per year of *experience* (compounded across years of ordination).
- *Adjust the minimum compensation standard annually* based on the average of the past 3 years Cost of Living Adjustment, in keeping with previous practice.
- *Revisit minimum compensation at least every 3 years* by performing the same calculation (average of comparable teacher salary in counties with PGA installed pastors) to ensure that minimum compensation does not fall below this level.
- Include an item on the annual clerk of session/session checklist that requests verification that a church is in compliance with the compounded cost-of-living adjustment yearly increase.

Synod of the South Atlantic STATED MEETING HIGHLIGHTS

APRIL 28-29, 2022

EPWORTH-BY-THE-SEA ST. SIMONS ISLAND, GEORGIA



- The Rev. Dr. David Shelor, Synod Moderator, Tampa Bay Presbytery, welcomed firsttime and returning Commissioners, first-time and returning Presbytery Leaders, Stated Clerks, Consultants for Racial Ethnic Ministries, the Synod's Presbyterian Women moderator, guests, and staff gathered to conduct the business of the Synod at Epworthby-the-Sea, St. Simons Island, Georgia, on April 28-29, 2022.
- The Rev. Joyce Lieberman, Synod Executive and Stated Clerk, reported on the status of the Synod, including the membership, the Presbytery and Synod minutes approvals, Synod Permanent Judicial Commission decisions, and her work schedule. The Synod offices moved in 2021 from the First Presbyterian Church, an ECO church, to the St. Augustine Presbytery. She was able to attend more Presbytery meetings by ZOOM in 2021, but has begun to increase her travel as Presbyteries and churches are opening up.
- Joyce also announced her retirement, effective September 30, 2022, and expressed her enjoyment in serving the Synod for the past five years. The Synod body approved her contract extension to that date.
- The Executive Administrative Commission (EAC) reported on the decisions made since the last Synod Stated Meeting:
 - The fall Stated Meeting for 2022 will be held by ZOOM on Thursday, November 3, 2022 at 10:00 am, eastern.
 - The spring Stated Meeting for 2023 will be held on February 22-25, 2023, at Epworth-By-The-Sea, St. Simons Island, Georgia, with tentative plans for an education event with workshops.
 - $\circ~$ The fall Stated Meeting for 2023 will be held by ZOOM on Tuesday, November 14 at 10:00 am, eastern.
- The Synod audit for 2021 was completed. The Synod investment policy remained a 70/30 investment ratio. The 2022 budget was approved with per capita remaining at \$1.50 and suggested mission giving remaining at \$1.00.

• The Rev. Debbie Foster, Executive Presbyter and Stated Clerk, Foothills Presbytery, facilitated rotating table discussions as to the future of the Synod.

- Trinity Presbyterian Church in Oroville, CA, Presbytery of North Central California, Synod of the Pacific responding to the Camp fire that impacted Paradise, CA and surrounding communities.
- La Casona de Monteflores in San Juan, PR, Presbytery of San Juan, Synod in Boriquén responding to Hurricanes Irma and Maria.



- New Hope Village at Neuse Forest Presbyterian Church, New Bern, NC, New Hope Presbytery, Synod of the Mid Atlantic responding to Hurricanes Matthew and Florence.
- Presbyterian Church of the Cross, Omaha NE, Presbytery of Missouri River Valley, Synod of Lakes and Prairies responding to severe flooding.
- We also support an independent site at First Presbyterian Church in Madisonville, KY, Presbytery of Western Kentucky, Synod of Living Waters responding to tornado damage.



Seven Marks of Vital Congregations

1	LIFELONG Discipleship Formation vs. Complacent "Christian" piety, simply teaching good morals, or offering the latest programs.	 "The righteousness that comes through faith in Christ, the righteousness of God based on faith." (PHIL. 3:9B) From the cradle to the grave seeking to be formed for right living with God and with all people. Faith — seeking understanding, cultivating wisdom, and actively following Christ. It is not an extra-curricular activity nor merely head-knowledge. Discipleship awakened and engaged in issues facing today's culture: injustice, inequality, divisive segregation, oppression, suffering, abuse of creation. Discipleship formed and strengthened in the community of Christ and permeates daily practices and daily living.
2	Intentional Authentic Evangelism vs. "Jesus freaks"; "Christian" Hypocrisy; A committee.	 "We have this treasure in clay jars, so that it may be made clear that this extraordinary power belongs to God." (2 COR. 4:7) Intentionally sharing the Good News of Jesus Christ, not just acts of kindness. Authentically sharing Christ because it is intrinsic to self-identity; overflow of Christ in our life. Relational, not programmatic or systematic
3	Outward Incarnational Focus vs. Inward Institutional Survival; Closed communities of assimilation/exclusion.	 "The gate is narrow and the road is hard that leads to life, and there are few who find it." (MATT. 7:14) Outward exploration, awareness, and focus on neighbors and neighborhood. Beyond relationship with those who are like us, the incarnate Christ dwells among the lowly & least, the stranger & the suffering, the marginalized & majority. Missional focus on where Christ is already living and present and calling us to dwell.
4	Empower Servant Leadership vs. the Pastor's job; monopolized leadership; hiring the young energetic pastor; burning out good volunteers.	 "The harvest is plentiful, but the laborers are few; therefore, ask the Lord of the harvest to send out laborers." (MATT. 9:37–38) Identify, nurture, support the use of spiritual gifts of all people to serve; not monopolized cliques of power. All voices and people are necessary, and it is noticeable when people are absent/missing. Nurture and encourage those specifically called and gifted for pastoral ministry.



5	Spirit-Inspired Worship vs. Self-gratifying worship, stale ritual divorced of meaning, or consumer entertainment worship	 "These people draw near with their mouths and honor me with their lips, while their hearts are far from me, and their worship of me is a human commandment learned by rote." (ISAIAH 29:13) Worship is about God. We get to come on holy ground, encounter God, and experience wonder. Worship is active participation in the living relationship of the triune God, thus all should feel welcome just as they are to come. Worship challenges, teaches, transforms, encounters, convicts, and sends people out different.
6	Caring Relationships vs. Any other Social Club; façades, hypocrisy, and judgment of "church" and "religion."	 "By this everyone will know that you are disciples, if you have love for one another." (JOHN 13:35) Sharing in God's true agape moves us beyond half-hearted programmatic participation, lukewarm faith, and pretending. Instead of a closed, judgmental community, people find freedom to share stories, encounter the Savior, and ask for help. Welcome and hospitality are not left to a committee, but, imperfectly, we strive for all people find identity, purpose, and belonging in the household of God. Confront conflict, seek reconciliation in all divisions, find ways to embrace all diversity, seek to be peace-makers and bridge builders together.
7	Ecclesial Health vs. Unhealthy dysfunction; toxic environments; obsolete and irrelevant buildings	 "The body does not consist of one member but of many. God has so arranged the body that there may be no dissension within the body, but the members may have the same care for one another." (1 COR. 12:14, 24B-25) Understanding of: Why we are a church community? How are we a church community in practice? Prayer permeates all life together. Clarity in mission, core values to ministry, passion and joy in being the church. Our budget reflects these values, vision, and ministries. Fiscally responsible — stewardship and tithing are taught, transparency in spending, continual assessment/discernment of a sustainable budget. All are aware of how decisions are made, stake-holders in the process and procedures, valued voices in the envisioning, open to changes, continual assessment of the "why" and "how" we are church together. Nurturing and supporting the health of pastor(s), staff, and all called to lead; fighting against burnout.

Opportunities for Presbytery Service

During the Pandemic, all meetings are virtual until further notice.

Committees and Commissions of the Presbytery need you! If interested and able, please complete and return requested forms (Volunteer Interest Form and General Assembly Interest Form) found with full descriptions of the committees/commissions at <u>http://atlpcusa.org/committees</u>. Terms for committees & commissions are ordinarily 3 years with eligibility for re-election to a maximum of 6 years. The * indicates that committee members must be Ruling Elders or Teaching Elders in the PC (USA).

*Bills and Overtures Committee/General Assembly (GA) Commissioner – prepares for, attends and participates in the General Assembly and reports to the Presbytery. Serves as the Presbytery Bills and Overtures Committee for two years following the General Assembly.

*Committee on Ministry (COM) - provides care of congregations, pastors and educators. Ordinarily meets on the 3rd Thursday of each month from 5 - 6:30 PM at the Presbytery office. Subcommittees also meet monthly.

*Committee on Preparation for Ministry (CPM) - works with inquirers and candidates as they discern calls to ministry and move through the requirements for ordination. Ordinarily meets on the 4th Thursday of the month from 4:30 - 7:30 PM, alternating between in-person at Shallowford Presbyterian Church and on Zoom.

Dismantling Racism- a new committee of the Presbytery getting off the ground in 2022. The committee looks at ways congregations may be more engaged in education and action around racism.

***Presbytery Council** - guides, plans and envisions staffing needs and directions to be taken by the Presbytery. Meets 6 Monday evenings from 5:00-7:00 pm at the Presbytery office.

Committee on Representation (COR) - offers ways to live out the church's commitment to inclusiveness and representation. Meets 4 times each year during the day at the Presbytery office.

*Examinations Commission - examines all ministers who wish to be received into the Presbytery for membership during monthly meetings on the third Thursday afternoon from 1 - 4 PM at the Presbytery office.

Grants Committee - awards three primary grants each year to churches or other organizations. Also considers awards for seminarians. Ordinarily meets at the Presbytery office in May and October.

*New Church Development Commission (NCDC) - catalyzes and supports the development of new worshipping communities throughout our presbytery. Meets for an annual half day strategic planning meeting and quarterly on Wednesdays, 10:30 am - 12:30 pm at the offices of the Presbytery. The Operations, Development and Advisory teams meet as needed, some face to face and some online.

*Nominating Committee –Identifies and recruits volunteers for all Presbytery committees. Meets 3-4 mornings a year at the Presbytery office.

Operations Committee - manages financial and business processes of the Presbytery. Meets quarterly on Mondays at 2 PM at the Presbytery office. Subcommittees meet additionally.

***Permanent Judicial Commission (PJC)** - exercises church discipline through judicial process. Meets as necessary during one term of 6 years.

Personnel Committee – provides guidance, expertise and assistance to the Presbytery staff re: matters of personnel. Quarterly meetings on weekdays, usually on Mondays, noon – 1:30 pm, at the Presbytery office.

*Synod Commissioners - represent the Presbytery at 1-2 Synod meetings each year of a 4 year term.

Presbytery Worship and Planning Committee - assists in planning worship and order of business for stated Presbytery meetings. Meets approximately 6 weeks prior to each Stated Presbytery Meeting, usually at upcoming host churches and once annually with Council to discuss themes.
